In February 2022, Amanda's world turned upside down when a routine walk-in clinic visit led to a diagnosis of blood cancer, a form of leukemia called Myelodysplastic Syndrome (MDS). After 12 rounds of chemotherapy and a bone marrow transplant, Amanda spent months in isolation, unable to be near her daughters due to her compromised immune system. She has been in remission for three years and continues to be cared for by the wonderful staff at Moffitt Cancer Center, though she still manages ongoing complications from treatment. The family currently lives in a second floor apartment where navigating the stairs has become difficult, and they are cramped for space.
